**Building Power, A Message from the Executive Director**



## 2017 Financial Summary


**EXPENSES \$155,281**



# Public Lands

## NORTH FORK GOES TO DC

A delegation from the North Fork Valley traveled to Washington D.C. to raise the profile of our remarkable home, advocating for a productive and vibrant future. North Fork delegates represented solar, agricultural, recreation, and conservation groups. They met with western CO's congressional delegation including Senator Michael Bennet (pictured below) and staff of Rep. Tipton and Sen. Gardner.



## GRAND MESA, UNCOMPAHGRE, & GUNNISON (GMUG)

### FOREST PLAN REVISION

In June 2017, the GMUG Planning team kicked off its Forest Plan revision process to update the existing plan, which was created in 1983. The Conservation Center, along with our regional conservation partners, provided recommendations for potential wilderness and special management designations to the GMUG planning team. We will keep advocating for administrative protections for our forest's incredible natural resources throughout this multi-year process.



## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2018

**GUNNISON PUBLIC LANDS INITIATIVE (GPLI)** - A diverse coalition of stakeholders representing 10 public-land-based organizations in Gunnison County have been working for multiple years on a consensus-based process developing comprehensive management recommendations for the public lands in the county. This includes lands within the North Fork watershed.

**BLM RESOURCE MANAGEMENT PLAN (RMP)** - The RMP will soon be back. We are expecting a final proposed RMP to be released in 2018. Stay tuned for ways to show your support for sensible public land protections.

**Methane Working Group** - WSCC is engaged with Delta and Gunnison Counties and local coal mines to find win-win solutions for mitigating and capturing the large amounts of methane being vented by the mines.

## NORTH FORK VALLEY IS TOO WILD TO DRILL


In 2017, The Wilderness Society released their *Too Wild To Drill* campaign, which chronicles our nation's last remaining wild places that are under tremendous threat from pressures for oil, gas, and mineral extraction on public lands. The North Fork of the Gunnison - along with iconic landscapes like the Arctic Wildlife Refuge and the Greater Grand Canyon Watershed - has the bittersweet honor of being *Too Wild To Drill*. This campaign has elevated our local voice of opposition to oil and gas extraction, bringing national attention to our fight to protect our home.




# Watershed

## North Fork Environmental & Recreation Needs Assessment

Thanks to a 2016 grant from the Colorado Water Conservation Board, WSCC and the North Fork Water Conservancy District worked to take the first steps in developing a plan to address water infrastructure needs and mitigate conflicts between water users in our local watershed.

The groups produced two parallel assessments to identify current agricultural, environmental, and recreation needs along the North Fork of the Gunnison. These assessments synthesize all pre-existing inventories of the North Fork, assess current stakeholder concerns regarding agricultural, environmental and recreation needs, and recommend priorities for addressing those needs according to eight river segments newly designated for future implementation of recommendations included in the assessments.



## Paonia River Park Working Group

In 2017, WSCC established a River Park Working Group made up of local residents. The Working Group is focusing on the next phases of the River Park, including improvements to park infrastructure, replacing the old Minnesota Creek bridge, erecting a new entrance sign, and installing dog stations for bags and leashes. Maintaining our community connection to the river corridors remains an essential need on the Western Slope.

## Event-Based Water Quality Monitoring

In 2017, WSCC implemented a new type of water quality monitoring to supplement our River Watch program: Event-Based Water Monitoring. To prepare for an abnormal event in the watershed, we developed a protocol to collect samples at specific locations outside of our regular sampling windows. Our event-based water quality monitoring program helped us collect important data on turbidity during the much needed construction repairs that took place during the draw-down at Paonia Reservoir this fall.

### \$1.7 MILLION FOR WESTERN SLOPE YOUTH!

In December, Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) announced their decision to award a \$1.72 Million Inspire Initiative grant to The Nature Connection (TNC: [thenatureconnection.net](http://thenatureconnection.net)). In the coming years, this grant will allow TNC and partners, including WSCC, to formalize outdoor education programming across Cedaredge, Crawford, Delta, Hotchkiss, Olathe, and Paonia. It will connect the traditional educational programming offered to students in the region, to match winter ecology, canyon trips, outdoor days, and more to grade-level-specific goals. The inspire initiative is also providing funding for a "Gear Library" for students, and place development across the county.

# Education



Thanks to funds appropriated from the state lottery, GOCO's Inspire Initiative supports community coalitions in connecting youth to Colorado's outdoors. To this end, the Inspire Initiative establishes "places for kids and their families to play and connect with the outdoors, programs that activate those places, and pathways to outdoor stewardship and leadership roles."



### YON By the Numbers


